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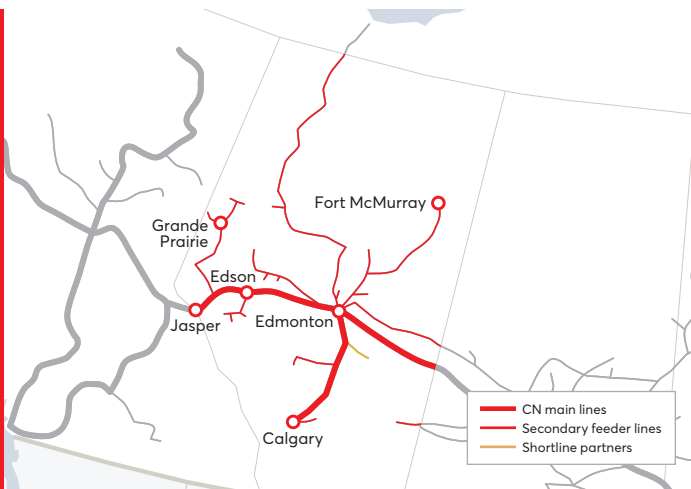

Our operations support over 6,600 jobs in the province and add \$1B to Alberta's GDP*

CN handles intermodal container traffic through our Edmonton and Calgary terminals. In Edmonton, where more than 3,300 CN railroaders live and work, we have automotive distribution and CargoFlo® bulk handling facilities as well as metals and forest products distribution centres. In Calgary, which over 300 CN employees call home, you'll find our logistics park, automotive, metals and forest products distribution centres, and a CargoFlo® bulk handling facility. Edmonton and Calgary are also home to major rail classification yards. CN maintains large railcar and locomotive repair shops at Edmonton's Walker Yard. In Fort McMurray, there's a metals distribution centre and a CargoFlo® facility. We also have another forest products distribution centre in Edson.

New Energy Solutions

We continue to make significant investments in our corridors between Edmonton and West Coast ports to support growth in propane, chemicals and other refined petroleum products. The Government of Alberta's incentive programs are encouraging the development of new petrochemical facilities in the province. For example, Dow is building a net-zero facility near Edmonton in the Alberta Industrial Heartland with direct access to CN's route to Prince Rupert. The facility will produce 3.2 million metric tonnes of polyethylene and ethylene derivatives.

Network Investments

In 2025, CN completed two new double-track segments on the Edson Subdivision between Edmonton and Jasper, increasing capacity on this critical corridor by about 25%. The upgrades allow more trains to move between the Prairies and key West Coast export gateways at Vancouver and Prince Rupert, supporting the efficient movement of grain, energy products, forest products and other goods to global markets.

Over the past decade, CN has invested about \$3.5 billion to build and maintain a safe and efficient network in Alberta and to support our supply chain partners. Expansion projects included the construction of new and extended sidings as well as double tracking sections of our main lines. Maintenance projects focused on the replacement of rail and ties, plus upkeep of crossings, bridges, culverts, signals, and other track infrastructure.

Community Investments

In 2025, CN contributed to many Alberta-based organizations, including:

TERRA CENTRE CN helped advance the work of Terra Centre, which empowers pregnant and parenting teens through education, early childhood programs, mental health services, and life-skills training to help young families build brighter futures.

YOUNG WOMEN IN SKILLED TRADES AND TECHNOLOGY Through its community investment efforts, CN supported programming that introduces young women to skilled trades and technology, helping junior high, senior high, and post-secondary students develop the skills needed to succeed in a rapidly evolving workforce.

PAUL FIRST NATION – BISON FENCE PROJECT Support from CN helped Paul First Nation in constructing a new fence to secure their bison herd, strengthening local food security initiatives and supporting the revitalization of cultural and spiritual traditions on community lands.

MACEWAN UNIVERSITY – INDIGENOUS STUDENT PROGRAMS CN collaborated with MacEwan University to support programs designed to expand educational opportunities and support success for Indigenous students.
