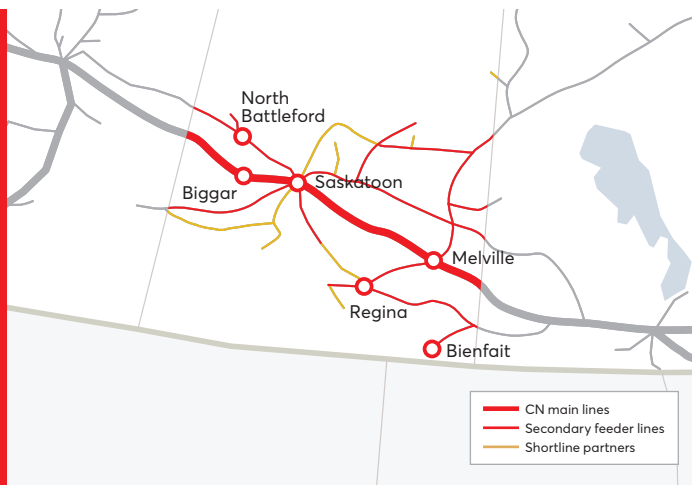

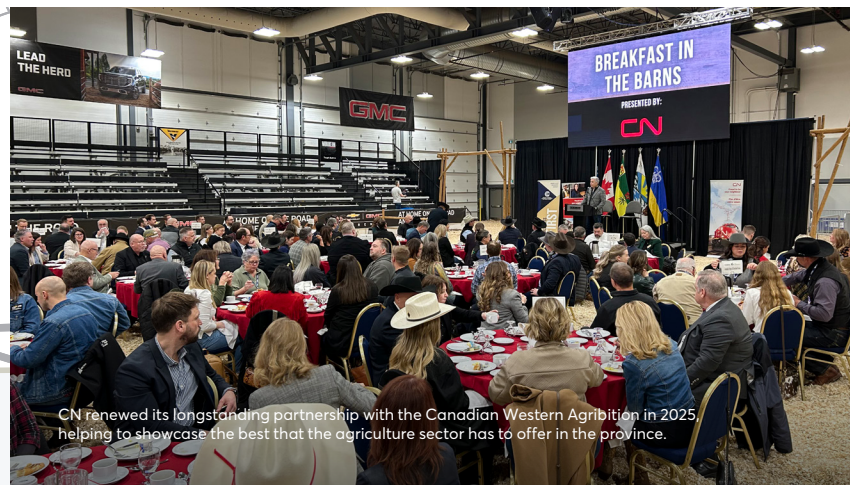
Intermodal

Our operations support over 3,400 jobs in the province and add \$786M to Saskatchewan's GDP*

Grains and fertilizers, especially potash, make up most of the traffic handled by CN in this Prairie province. Our traffic also reflects the increasing diversification of the Saskatchewan economy by handling growing volumes of consumer goods and specialty crops through our intermodal terminal in Saskatoon and Canada's first privately operated intermodal terminal in Regina. Both Saskatoon and Bienfait boast metals distribution facilities. Saskatoon, where almost 500 CN railroaders live and work, also has an automotive distribution centre. Melville is home to CN's largest rail classification yard in Saskatchewan and has close to 400 CN employees. Finally, in North Battleford, we have a forest products distribution facility.

Network Investments

Over the past decade, CN has invested about \$2.2 billion to build and maintain a safe and efficient network in Saskatchewan and to support our supply chain partners. Expansion projects included rebuilding bridges and upgrading track and switches to better serve grain customers. Maintenance projects focused on the replacement of rail and ties, plus upkeep of crossings, bridges, culverts, signals, and other track infrastructure.



CN renewed its longstanding partnership with the Canadian Western Agribition in 2025, helping to showcase the best that the agriculture sector has to offer in the province.

Community Investments

In 2025, CN contributed to many Saskatchewan-based organizations, including:

AGRICULTURE IN THE CLASSROOM SASKATCHEWAN (AITC-SK) CN partnered with Agriculture in the Classroom Saskatchewan, which equips students with hands-on learning experiences in STEM, health, and sustainability while fostering critical thinking, environmental stewardship, and greater understanding of Canada's food systems.

OUTSASKATOON - STRONGER FOUNDATIONS PROGRAM Support from CN helped fund OUTSaskatoon's Stronger Foundations program, helping fund a dedicated staff position to support Pride Home and ensure sustainable, inclusive, and culturally safe services for 2SLGBTQ+ youth.

STARS AIR AMBULANCE CN contributed to STARS Air Ambulance through sponsorship of the Field of STARS fundraising dinner, helping provide rapid, specialized helicopter emergency medical transport to people in remote and rural communities across the Canadian Prairies.

COTE FIRST NATION HEALTH CLINIC CN helped advance the work of the Cote First Nation Health Clinic, which provides essential health services and programs for Indigenous children and adults while promoting a safe and healthy community environment.

UNIVERSITY OF REGINA & FIRST NATIONS UNIVERSITY - INDIGENOUS FORUM INITIATIVE CN supported an initiative benefiting Indigenous communities across Canada, with a focus on Saskatchewan, by fostering dialogue, collaboration, and reconciliation through engagement with Indigenous students, faculty, and community leaders.
